depicting the *Paderborn Cross*¹, a tribute to the beginnings of
our Community in Sandhurst.

¹The Paderborn Cross

The Paderborn Cross, which was worn as a badge or brooch in earlier times, is Paderborn's oldest Christian symbol. It was discovered recently in a grave more than 1200 years old. Byzantine style can be seen in the rounded edges of the arms and portrays connection between the cross and the tree of life in the book of Genesis. It possibly has both Lombardy and Celtic influences. St Kilian came from Ireland to the district of present-day Paderborn, Germany, in the seventh century as a missionary and its first Bishop. Dr Henry Backhaus, the first priest of the Bendigo Goldfields, came from Paderborn. Crosses made from this design were presented by the Archbishop of Paderborn to the Sandhurst Diocese in August 1999.

This new processional cross, in the style of a Paderborn Cross, was commissioned by Bishop Shane Mackinlay as part of the celebrations of 150th Anniversary of the founding of the Sandhurst Diocese. Martin Coman is responsible for its design and construction. Martin is a furniture craftsman and member of the Cathedral Cluster of Parishes. The cross is made from two types of wood. Sugar pine (*Pinus lambertiana*) is the light-coloured wood. The sugar pine for the cross was sourced from remnants of timber used as rafter capping in the ceiling of Sacred Heart Cathedral. Australian blackwood (*Acacia melanoxylon*) is the darker timber. It is a local hardwood and the timber for the cross was sourced from Martin's property. Blackwood was also used in the construction of the pews in Sacred Heart Cathedral.

A contribution towards the cost of the design and construction of the cross was provided by the Knights of the Southern Cross, Victoria Branch.

The Bishop sprinkles the cross with holy water in silence; afterwards, he incenses the cross.

**THE COMMEMORATION OF THE LORD'S
ENTRANCE INTO JERUSALEM**

FIRST FORM: THE PROCESSION

Once all ministers are ready, at an appropriate time, the people gather once again before the statue of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop. The faithful hold branches in their hands.

ANTIPHON

BISHOP: In the name of the Father, ✠ and of the Son,

since the beginning of Lent until now
we have prepared our hearts
by penance and charitable works.
Today we gather together
to herald with the whole Church
the beginning of the celebration
of our Lord's Paschal mystery,
that is to say, of his Passion and Resurrection.
For it was to accomplish this mystery
that he entered his own city of Jerusalem.
Therefore, with all faith and devotion,
let us commemorate

the Lord's entry into the city for our salvation,
following in his footsteps, so that,
being made by his grace partakers of the Cross,
we may have a share also
in his Resurrection and in his life.

After the address, the presider says one of the following prayers with hands extended.

BISHOP: Let us pray.

Almighty ever-living God,
sanctify ✠ these branches with your blessing,
that we, who follow Christ the King in exultation,
may reach the eternal Jerusalem through him.
Who lives and reigns for ever and ever.

ALL: Amen.

He sprinkles the branches with holy water without saying anything.

One of the concelebrating priests proclaims in the usual way the Gospel concerning the Lord's entrance according to Mark (Year B).

GOSPEL

Mark 11:1-10

PRIEST: The Lord be with you.

ALL: And with your spirit.

PRIEST: A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark.

ALL: Glory to you, O Lord.

PRIEST: When they drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples, and said to them, 'Go into the village opposite you, and immediately as you enter it you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat; untie it and bring it. If any one says to you, "Why are you doing this?" say, "The Lord has need of it and will send it back here immediately.'" And they went away, and found a colt tied at the door out in the open street; and they untied it. And those who stood there said to them, 'What are you doing, untying the colt?' And they told them what Jesus had said; and they let them go. And they brought the colt to Jesus, and threw their garments

on it; and he sat upon it. And many spread their garments on the road, and others spread leafy branches which they had cut from the fields. And those who went before and those who followed cried out, 'Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is coming! Hosanna in the highest!'

The Gospel of the Lord.

ALL: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

After the Gospel, a brief homily may be given. Then, to begin the procession, an invitation may be given by a priest or a Deacon or a lay minister, in these or similar words:

BISHOP: Dear brethren (brothers and sisters),
like the crowds who acclaimed Jesus in Jerusalem,
let us go forth in peace.

Then the procession to the Jubilee door sets off in the usual way. The thurifer goes first, carrying a thurible with burning incense, then an acolyte or another minister, carrying the newly-blessed processional cross decorated with palm branches according to local custom, between two ministers with lighted candles. Then follow a Priest carrying the Book of the Gospels, concelebrating priests, the Bishop with the ministers, and, after them, all the faithful carrying branches.

THE OPENING OF THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY JUBILEE DOOR³

ENTRANCE INTO THE CATHEDRAL

The procession stops at the Jubilee door of the Cathedral. The Bishop faces the Jubilee door.

BISHOP: Open the gates of justice,
we shall enter and give thanks to the Lord.

³ The Jubilee Door

Within the context of the Eucharistic celebration, the specific gesture that marks the beginning of the Jubilee Year is the opening of the “Porta Sancta” (Holy Door) and the solemn procession of the local church — the bishop, clergy, and people — into the cathedral, the Mother Church of all the faithful, where the Chief Shepherd of the diocese exercises his magisterial role, celebrates the sacred mysteries, carries out the liturgical acts of praise and supplication, and guides the ecclesial community.

A Porta Sancta (Holy Door) is a special door in a cathedral or basilica that is usually only opened during Jubilee Years. In the context of the significant anniversary of our local Church, Sacred Heart Cathedral has been designated as one of the Jubilee Churches along with the foundational churches of Sandhurst. Crossing the threshold of these churches through the Holy Door is more than just regularly entering a church — it signifies obtaining the Lord’s mercy and salvation. Anyone who visits any of the declared Jubilee churches and enters through the Holy Doors will be granted plenary indulgence, that is, the removal of temporal punishment due to sins that have been forgiven.

Pope St John Paul II in his Bull of Indiction of the Great Jubilee of the Year 2000 declares that entering through a Holy Door “evokes the passage from sin to grace which every Christian is called to accomplish... There is only one way that opens wide the entrance into the life of communion with God: this is Jesus, the one and absolute way to salvation.” Entering through the Holy Door represent passage: sin to redemption, life to death, disbelief to faith. Jesus describes himself as The Door. People have to enter through Christ to get to the Father. The door is the path to salvation.

As we gather as a local Church to celebrate 150 years since the establishment of our local Church, we pass through the Holy Door as proclaim the richness of God’s mercy to the world and commit ourselves to proclaim the Lord to the world.

The Bishop strikes the Jubilee door with the foot of the newly-blessed processional cross.

BISHOP: This is the Lord’s gate:
let us enter through it and obtain mercy and salvation.

The Bishop opens the Jubilee door. He then kneels on the threshold of the doors for a short moment of prayer. Fr Junray gives the Book of the Gospels to the Bishop. Standing at the threshold, the Bishop holds up the Book of the Gospels while the antiphon indicated is sung. While the Book of the Gospels is shown, Fr Brian carrying the newly-blessed processional cross stands directly next to the Celebrant.

ANTIPHON

CANTOR: I am the gate, says the Lord,
whoever enters through me, will be saved;
he will enter and go out and find pasture.

Once the antiphon is finished, the procession begins again and moves toward the narthex: The thurible, cross, candles, the other ministers, the Book of the Gospels, followed by the Priests, the Bishop, and the faithful. In the meantime, a Psalm is sung until the procession reaches the narthex of the Cathedral.



A Plenary Indulgence is “a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints” (Enchiridion Indulgentiarum, Normae de Indulgentiis, Libreria Editrice Vaticana, 1999, p. 21; cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 1471).

“...The starting-point for understanding indulgences is the abundance of God’s mercy revealed in the Cross of Christ. The crucified Jesus is the great ‘indulgence’ that the Father has offered humanity through the forgiveness of sins and the possibility of living as children (cf. Jn 1:123 in the Holy Spirit (cf. Gal 4:6; Rom 5:5; 8:15-16).” An indulgence is an “expression of the Church’s full confidence of being heard by the Father when—in view of Christ’s merits and, by his gift, those of Our Lady and the saints—she asks him to mitigate or cancel the painful aspect of punishment by fostering its medicinal aspect through other channels of grace. In the unfathomable mystery of divine wisdom, this gift of intercession can also benefit the faithful departed, who receive its fruits in a way appropriate to their condition.” - John Paul II, General Audience, 29 September 1999.
